Accessing the Church Building Outside – Falls from Height • Access requiring the use of ladders, hatches and sloping roofs • Restricted access widths around tower • Inadequate protection afforded by parapets • Fragile roofing material • Low parapeting or castellations along the tops of the tower or external walls • Damaged ladders or access equipment	Anyone accessing the church building at height	 The tower is kept locked and access is strictly controlled Only volunteers and professionals trained in the hazards and precautions are allowed to access the church building at height A separate risk assessment will be carried our should we open the tower to the public on special occasions 		Church Warden

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Version Control:

• This risk assessment has been written as an amalgamation and update to 2 existing risk assessments for All Saints Church Clifton and to include more detail as suggested wrt risk assessments on the *Ecclesiastical* website

- These 2 risk assessments are the General Risk Assessment for Regular Church Services (v 1.0 issue date 20th April 2017) and the Risk Assessment for Opening Church Buildings during Covid-19 (v 10, issue date 16th July 2021) and they have been combined as suggested in the Church of England's most recent advice on Opening and Managing Church Buildings during Covid-19 (v 3.2, 18th July 2022, House of Bishops Covid-19 Recovery Group) available on the Church's website which states "There is no longer a requirement to do a specific COVID-19 risk assessment. You can choose to include COVID-19 in general risk assessments for events and activities"
- A more detailed risk assessment is available for bell ringing activities
